

# Cathedral Deanery Newsletter

Autumn 2023



In June, representatives from every community in our deanery met in Arundel, with the deanery clergy, to continue discussing the future of the church in this area, and everyone's role in shaping it. The meeting opened in prayer and reflection and the Dean, Canon Peter Newsam, then introduced the context of where we are in the church locally. He noted that we need to co-operate more fully and share experience, and that we can look at the losses and feel sad, but we need to move forward: there are more Christian communities now than clergy, so they become places where the community is looking after itself and one another, share experience and share expertise. Canon Peter acknowledged that Mass times and finances are not the place to start: they will need addressing but they must not be our starting points.

Canon Peter suggested that discussions start from the question 'What do vibrant apostolic communities look like?' because if we deal with that question, then the number of clergy serving them is not defining. The group broke into discussion groups of two or three, mixing up the parishes, to discuss three questions. Here they are, with the thoughts that were fed back to the whole group:

## What do vibrant lively Christian communities look like? What are their characteristics? What is happening in them?

Mass & the Eucharist

- the foundation on which we build

Welcoming

- vibrant communities are welcoming, to everyone
- they welcome people who are outside the church
- initial welcomes are followed up on - Alpha can be useful
- there they must be some knowledge about people, and curiosity

Good models

- communities think about what they have done well recently & share
- they learn from others, e.g. our twin diocese in Peru, where churches might have one Mass a year, so people lead the community

Joyful, communicative,  
inclusive & kind

- they ensure people and priests do not burn out
- they have dialogue, not just agreeing with Father.
- they ensure everyone is brought along in the process of change, e.g. that people who will struggle with the change away from a parish shepherd/flock structure are not isolated

Gifts, talents &  
structures

- people's charisms and how to use them are identified
- roles and tasks to fill in parishes are identified
- people are empowered in new roles
- expectations are clear, e.g. in a community-led parish, what is the expectation with the priests and who checks in?

The second part of the discussion, in larger groups, was on the topic:

**What do we need to do to make this happen:  
a church community confident, alive and able to cope with or without a priest?**



After the discussion and feedback, there were a couple of questions from the group, in particular:

Is there a timeline for the coming changes in numbers of priests?

Canon Peter replied that there is not, 'but we need to keep moving.'

The meeting concluded with prayer and a request to encourage all present to talk about the meeting and the questions it raised, and with the reading of a paragraph from the Pastoral Plan:

*May [our parishes] be communities where the Lord is known and loved; where the liturgy is experienced as an encounter with the wonder of heaven; where daily prayer is a natural part of life; where all are welcomed and their dignity as children of God always recognized; where young people grow in deep love for the Gospel, for the sacramental life of the Church and for prayer; where all know the riches of the faith and seek to share it with others.*

## The Cathedral Deanery & the Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes 2023



Many pilgrims from our deanery joined the annual diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes this year, for a week of prayer, renewal and fellowship, in answer to Our Lady's call. This year's meditation for all pilgrimages to Lourdes is, in Our Lady's words, 'Go and tell the priests to build a chapel here' and pilgrims are invited to consider what it means, for us and in our time, to 'build a chapel.' From the youngest children (using Duplo!), to the Year 10-11 Redshirts, to the most mature pilgrims, everyone thought about their role as living bricks, building up the Church. Some of our deanery's pilgrims, who had various roles on the pilgrimage, share their thoughts on the week, here:

Yes, it can be hard work but people are so friendly and helpful, meeting for coffee, ice creams, drinks or just general chitchat. I first went on pilgrimage in 1996 as a Helper and wondered what on earth I was letting myself in for but the support and friendship is second to none. Some of the friends I made then are still part of the pilgrimage, some are married and are bringing their own children along, some are like me and too old to be a helper but come as an 'ordinary' pilgrim. These days the pilgrimage has a slightly different perspective for me as my sister died two years ago at the end of July so her anniversary falls within the pilgrimage dates. ## Arundel Cathedral - 150th Anniversary Celebrations

On Sunday 2 July, after the glorious diocesan celebrations of the cathedral's 150th anniversary, came the parish's own celebration, with sunshine, jazz, cake and a giant, human '150' in the cathedral gardens!

The Cathedral was originally constructed as the parish church for Arundel. When it opened on 1st July 1873 it was dedicated to St Philip Neri. It became a cathedral at the creation of the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton in 1965.
